Direct action to support authors affected by book bans

Report Spam Reviews

Censors are spamming authors reviews on Amazon. Help stop them by:

- 1. Locate targeted book on Amazon.
- 2. Filter to 1 star reviews.
- 3. Click "Report" any review using censor keywords like "harmful to minors", "porn", "filth".

Elevate 5 Star Reviews

To balance spam from censors, elevate 5 star reviews by marking them as "Helpful". Do so by:

- 1. Locate book on Amazon.
- 2. Filter to 5 star reviews.
- 3. Mark reviews as "Helpful".

Create Positive Content

If you've read the book, start creating positive content through the following methods:

- Writing your own reviews
- Sharing reviews, praise, photos reading the book on all SM platforms
- Participate in #FreadomFridays



How to find compatible Board of Ed candidates

- 1. Email the candidates or pose questions on their campaign sites
 - Addresses available from County Clerk's office (see Hunterdon County, NJ)
 - Request answers to the questions that concern you
 - Ask whether the candidate has signed the <u>Unite Against Book Bans</u>
 candidate pledge to support the freedom to read and oppose book bans
- 2. Host or attend a candidate forum
- 3. Examine candidate's social media posts, especially in the year before the election
- 4. Search candidate's name in Facebook groups dedicated to the issues you care about, pro and con
 - Candidates appearing in these groups active in NJ would be problematic on issues of intellectual freedom and diversity:
 - Moms for Liberty
 - NJ Fresh Faced Schools
 - o NJ No Left Turn in Education
 - <u>Team PYC</u> (Protect Your Children)
- 5. Review BOE meeting public comments over the past year
 - Posted on district's BOE site
 - Videos and/or transcripts
- 6. Talk to friends and neighbors
- 7. Ask teachers or school librarians
- 8. Ask a teacher's association representative
- 9. Check local news media for coverage or endorsements
- 10. Connect with your local political party organization
- 11. Check candidate's party affiliations
 - Not always a reliable indicator
 - Majorities on both sides oppose book-banning
 - But those who favor recent book-bannings tend to be registered R

When you've made your choices, share your research on social media or in conversations to help your friends and neighbors
